## **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF SOLID WASTE LICENSING**

Westchester County Government has an immediate opening for an Executive Director of the Solid Waste Commission responsible for the oversight and direction of said commission. This commission was created to serve as a watchdog to improve consumers' rights, lower costs, and foster fairness, honesty and competition in the carting and recycling industry. It operates under the Westchester County Solid Waste and Recyclables Collection Licensing Law (Chapter 826-a of the Laws of Westchester County), which requires comprehensive background checks of all applicants for a solid waste hauler's license, as part of a major effort by Westchester County to reduce the influence of organized crime in this industry.

Candidates must possess either a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice and six years of law enforcement experience, four of which must have been in criminal investigation and analysis, addressing cases related to the sanitation industry; or a J.D. degree and five years of experience adjudicating or prosecuting criminal cases including those involving waste management. Experience at the managerial level is also required.

**Compensation:** The Executive Director of Solid Waste Licensing is an Executive Level appointed position, reporting directly to the County Executive, with a current salary range of \$115,670 to \$147,975. The compensation package includes comprehensive benefits, including medical, dental, vision, deferred compensation, paid leave and NYS retirement plan.
