is to fund, monitor, and support
Westchester County non-profit agencies and
institutions that provide programs and
services to youth, in order to promote
positive youth development and encourage
healthy lifestyles.

INTRODUCTION TO WESTCHESTER COUNTY YOUTH BUREAU

FUNDING STREAMS

The Westchester County Youth Bureau provides funding through three sources; the New York State Office of Children and Family Services (NYSOCFS), Invest-in-Kids local tax levy, and Community Optional Preventive Services (COPS).

New York State Office of Children and Family Services

The New York State Office of Children and Family Services (NYSOCFS) designates the Westchester County Youth Bureau as its agent for distribution of four funding streams. Youth Development/ Delinquency Prevention Program Youth Services (YDPP-YS), Youth Initiatives Funding (YDPP-YI), Special Delinquency Prevention Program (SDPP), Runaway and Homeless Youth Act Funding (RHYA). The Westchester County Youth Bureau discharges its responsibilities for administering these four funding streams through annual application and contract processes with not-for-profit agencies.

Funding parameters for the four funding streams are set by the New York State Office of Children and Family Services. Funding priorities are determined by the Westchester County Youth Bureau through Integrated Services Planning Processes. Through use of Request for Proposals, Westchester County seeks proposals from not-for-profit organizations that meet the requirements of the New York State Office of Children and Family Services and Westchester County for distribution of funding.

The purpose and goals of the four funding streams offered through the NYSOCFS:

Youth Development/Delinquency Prevention Program Funding (Youth Initiatives - YI)

The New York State Legislature passed the Youth Initiatives Act in 1978 to encourage and support high priority youth programs in counties that have approved comprehensive Youth Development/ Delinquency Prevention – Youth Services Programs and which have reached their maximum funding eligibility. Westchester County meets the prerequisites for this funding. Youth Initiatives funding is allocated to Westchester County for distribution to support the development of programs that address one or more of the initiatives outlined in the 1978 legislation.

Eligible applicants are community-based organizations incorporated as private, not-for-profit corporations or municipal service corporations. Youth Initiative Programs must serve high-risk youth under the age of 21 years or provide support to high-risk families with children less than 21 years of age.

To achieve the purpose of the Youth Initiatives Act, high priority programs are as follows:

1. Community organization projects which assist in the development of advocacy and self-help programs.
2. School-related prevention programs that address truancy, school suspension, school dropouts, youth vandalism, and school violence or provide educational alternatives for youth. Projects designed to demonstrate positive results of partnership linkages between social agencies and schools are given special consideration.
3. Human sexuality, including programs which address teenage pregnancy and youth prostitution.
4. Prevention of inappropriate placement of youth in residential or institutional settings.
5. Programs related to early identification and assistance to troubled youth and their parents including projects directed toward child abuse, multi-problem families, training for parents, assistance to non-traditional families, and post institutional adjustment.
6. Projects for limited English-speaking youth.
7. Employment projects directed to assisting youth to obtain employment.

Youth Development/Delinquency Prevention Program Funding (Youth Services - YS)

The Youth Development/Delinquency Prevention Program (YDDP) funding was established to encourage the State's diverse communities to create local opportunities for positive youth development. YDDP-Youth Services supports services that provide opportunities for positive youth development and help youths attain the developmental assets needed to grow up to be competent, caring and healthy adults. Youth is defined as an individual less than 21 years of age.

To achieve the purpose of the Youth Services funding, programs must include:

1. Involvement of youth in leadership and program planning activities, program implementation and evaluation
2. Provide a range of youth in leadership and program planning activities, program implementation, and evaluation
3. Provide opportunities where young people feel supported and safe
4. Focus on asset building by supporting:
 - Positive values
 - Social competencies

- Positive Identity
- Educational commitment

Some examples of programs funded through YDDP-YS include but are not limited to:

- After school tutoring and cultural enrichment programs
- Mentoring programs
- Peer mediation programs
- Peer counseling programs
- Work readiness and job placement programs
- Youth advocacy programs
- Youth leadership programs
- Teenage pregnancy prevention programs

Special Delinquency Prevention Program Funding (SDPP)

The Special Delinquency Prevention Program (SDPP) is a specific initiative targeted for youth with well-defined needs. SDPP supports services aimed at keeping youth from becoming involved in the juvenile justice system or being chronically dependent on the human service system.

All programs under this initiative must serve “Targeted Youth”. Targeted Youth shall mean youth under 21 years of age who are:

- At risk of becoming person in need of supervision (PINS) or juvenile delinquents or charged with committing a crime
- Considered for placement outside the home
- Discharged into the community from institutional care or on parole
- Presently receiving community-based care as persons in need of supervision (PINS), juvenile delinquents (JD) or on probation
- Homeless youth or youth who have run away from home
- Chronically truant and/or illegally absent from school
- School dropouts
- Parents or about to become parents, or are children of a teenage parent, and lack adequate family supports
- Victims of child abuse, domestic violence, maltreatment, and/or neglect
- Members of a family who have had frequent involvement in the justice system and/or human services system, or lack adequate family supports
- Of limited English-speaking abilities
- In critical need of employment support services and jobs
- Involved in prostitution
- Exhibiting self-destructive behavior

Runaway and Homeless Youth Act Funding (RHYA)

New York State Office of Children and Family Services also provides RHYA funding to support services to reach, temporarily house and, whenever possible, reintegrate runaway and homeless shelter residents back into their families and communities. Westchester's funding is targeted to supporting the operation of a runaway hotline and shelter.

Westchester County Urban Youth Initiative (IUK)

In 1993, the Westchester County Urban Youth Initiative was established (under the Westchester County Youth Bureau Charter) as a mechanism for provision of local tax levy funding for expanded use of the positive youth development model in addressing the needs of at-risk youth under the age of 21 in eleven urban communities: Elmsford, Greenburgh, Mount Vernon, New Rochelle, Ossining, Peekskill, Port Chester, Sleepy Hollow, Tarrytown, White Plains and Yonkers. Since the inception of this funding stream, small grants have also been made available to community programs serving at-risk, income eligible youth based upon United States Department of Housing and Urban Development Community Development Block Grant Criteria.

The positive youth development model focuses on provision of opportunities for youth to actively acquire the skills and abilities needed to grow up to be competent, caring and healthy adults. Key elements of this model include:

1. Involvement of youth in leadership and service program planning activities, program implementation and program evaluation
2. Inclusion of parents, religious organizations, and the widest possible diversity of community groups and informal systems in the planning and implementation of youth services.
3. Provision of a range of structured activities for youth with diverse interest and needs.
4. Provision of opportunities where young people feel supported and safe.
5. Community and program focus on asset building by helping young people to acquire:
 - Positive values
 - Social competencies
 - Positive identity
 - Educational commitment

**Community Optional Preventive Services
(COPS)**

(Funding provided through Westchester County Department of Social Services)

The Community Optional Preventive Services Plan is designed to serve youth “who are not at imminent risk of foster care but as a group are considered at general risk of future foster care by virtue of one or more problematic behaviors” or presence of a cluster of youth risk indicators identified as early predictors of future risk for foster care placement or involvement in the juvenile justice system. COPS funding for the Youth Bureau will be used to support community / neighborhood based youth services and parenting programs aimed at reducing youth risk taking behaviors.

The Children's Village Sanctuary Program provides emergency shelter for over 200 Westchester runaway and homeless youths between the ages of 12 to 17. In addition to food, shelter and clothing, the program offers skilled assessment, medical care, counseling, case management, and aftercare services to stabilize youths in crisis and help them take control of their lives. The program provides a 24-hour Hotline, 1-888-997-1583, which serves approximately 500 callers annually. Emergency respite is also provided at the shelter to assist families and youths to work through issues to prevent youths from running away; from becoming a PINS (person in need of supervision); or from being placed outside of the home. The Sanctuary Program operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and serves youth countywide.

The Youth Enrichment Program has five components: Culture X Technology, Bilingual Girl and Boy Scouts, and Pace/Centro Hispano Tutorial and the Community Services Program for High School Students. The program will help to instill positive values, a commitment to learning, and social, moral, and emotional competencies. At completion of the program, participants will show 85-95% school progress; 85-95% will develop positive skills; 75-90% will make positive use of leisure time; 75-90% will show positive transition to adulthood and 75-95% of participating parents and youth will have knowledge of how to improve their health.
